

HOW TO VOTE in the Georgia Primaries



Elections matter because politicians create laws that help or hurt our families and communities. Regardless of our citizenship status or whether we are eligible to vote, election season is an important time for us to speak up and get involved in the political process.

An important part of this process, primaries are when we choose the candidates we want to vote for later in the general election. Georgia has an open primary. Any registered voter, whether registered with a political party or not, can take part. Voters participate in one party's primary. For example, if you vote in the Democratic primary, you cannot vote in the Republican primary.

Voters must choose which party's primary to vote in, then sign and return the form to receive a ballot.

WHAT IF I CAN'T VOTE?

In Georgia you must be 18 years old and a U.S. citizen to vote. If you have a past felony conviction, you must complete the sentence and any parole, supervision and court ordered probation, as well as pay all fines associated with the charges, before you can re-register to vote. In addition to voting, there are many ways that we can make a difference!
